Dystnee's the daughter of Darcey Martin and Adrian Rope. She resides in the Gibson district.

Her Indian name is Ban Zu gu, meaning Otter and she is a jingle dress

Her platform as Miss Shoshone-Bannock will be drug awareness.

Dystnee said she's honored to represent the







"Jeanette's presentation on cultural sovereignty talked a lot about the law, each segment of her discussion was tied to how important the language was and how the tribe understood the agreements they were entering into," he said. "Some of the case law that solidified our treaty rights, like the Tinno case regarding "fishing rights" - we call it hunting because that's how we go after the salmon, we walk the streams and spear them - that's how they won that court case against the state of Idaho."

Shay the noted agenda was really tight each day, with varied presentations ranging from language, culture, environmental, education and health, which kept the events moving along quickly. "The reunion planning committee has been working for several months trying to put this event together, including Language & Culture Preservation (LCPD) - they provided equipment, the Tribal Health programs, like the Cedar House (Waapi Kani Mental Wellness & Recovery Services), they did a lot of volunteering and kept things in order," he said.

"I want to thank all the supporters, staff that contributed their ideas, and those that stepped up to volunteer and present – the old volunteers, plus all the new ones," Shay said. He noted that this was the biggest group of volunteers they have had, with some volunteering for the first time. "I've always been trying to get younger people involved so they'll learn how to be

a part of and run an event like this in the future."

August 6

The first day of reunion events began with a sunrise ceremony on the morning of Tuesday, August 6. The Shoshone-Bannock Tribes served as host of the first day of events starting at sunrise in the old Fort Hall Casino parking lot where visiting members of participating tribes of the reunion came out for a prayer and smudge led by tribal elder and Sho-Ban reunion cocoordinator Darrell Shay.


