



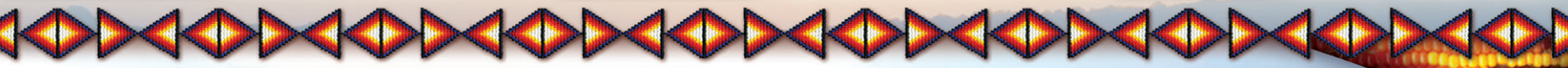

FORT HALL — Before sunrise on November 11, community members, students, and veterans gathered at Shoshone-Bannock Jr./Sr. High School to honor all who served during the annual Veterans Day Breakfast — a long-standing tradition sponsored by the Osborne family for more than three decades.

The morning began at 7 a.m. with a sunrise blessing in the school cafeteria, led by Darrell Shay, USMS, and Ron Diaz who took care of the fire. The ceremony opened with a prayer and for the well-being of veterans, families, and the community. Rooted in Shoshone-Bannock tradition, the blessing gave thanks for health, food, and protection while calling for strength and unity among those gathered.

nated bacon and sausage, Lamb Weston provided hash browns, and family members supplied eggs, pancakes, and condiments. Volunteers assisted with cooking, serving, and cleanup.

At 9 a.m., Veterans were invited to share their stories during an open-mic session. Some spoke about their service, while others listened. Veterans' display tables lined the foyer, filled with photographs, uniforms, and memorabilia representing generations for military service from the community. Each display offered a glimpse into the personal histories of those who served in the U.S. Army, Navy, Marine Corps, Air Force, and Coast Guard.

The Osborne family has organized the Veterans Day Breakfast for more than 35 years, beginning with elders who wanted to continue honoring their relatives who served in World War II. The event has grown into a community tradition that unites veterans, families, and

Solar farm proposal on Fort Hall Reservation subject of LUPC Public Hearing November 14

Project collaboration between Navajo Power & SBT Energy Resources

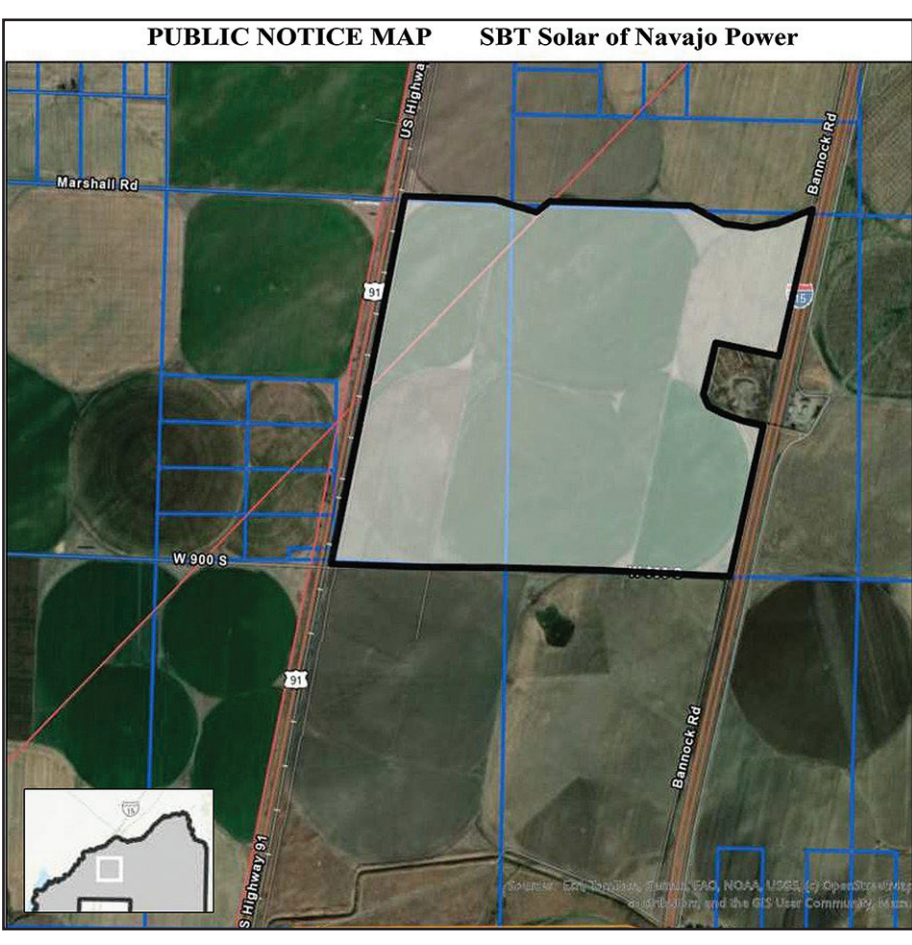
FORT HALL — The Shoshone-Bannock Tribes Land Use Policy Commission is conducting a public hearing November 14 at 5 p.m. in the Tribal Council Chambers concerning a special use permit Navajo Power is proposing for a renewable solar energy project.

Alana Edmo, Tribal Energy Resource manager, said it's a proposed demonstration concept being explored in collaboration with Navajo Power, a Native-owned company. "The intent of this early-stage effort is to assess whether a tribally-led project could be technically and financially viable."

She said they're currently in the site assessment phase that means there are still many variables that could influence whether the project moves forward.

The proposed site is 704 acres of previously disturbed land from the Tribes between Interstate 15 and Highway 91 for 40 years to develop a 100 MW large-scale solar energy and storage facility.

Edmo said the Tribes have not yet determined whether they support development at the proposed site and the meeting is part

of the process to share information and gather community feedback. Before any further steps can be taken, Navajo Power must apply for a special use permit lease to study the site in greater detail for interconnection purposes. "Because this type of lease has not been done before, it requires a public process ensuring community members have the opportunity to learn about the

proposal, ask questions and express their views." She said ultimately, if the community does not support the project, the Tribes will not proceed with pursuing the lease, shared ownership discussions or funding applications.

In addition, Edmo explained a nuclear feasibility study that is an exploratory study. She said the Energy Resources

Program regularly applies for federal grants to evaluate various types of energy technologies that could support the Tribes long-term energy needs and energy independence.

The current feasibility study (evaluate advanced nuclear technologies, particularly Small Modular Reactors (SMRs) and microreactors)

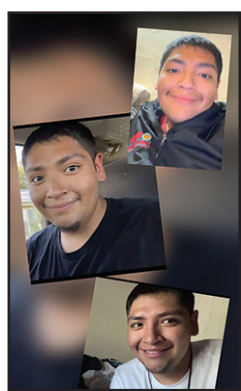
He was born on October 24, 2001, in Blackfoot, Idaho.

ISU hosts farewell reception for Hernandez & Herkshan

POCATELLO – Idaho State University's Native American Student Services (NASS) hosted a farewell potluck on Friday, November 7, honoring Effie Hernandez and Dr. Laticia Herkshan for their service to Native students, the university, and tribal communities.

The event was at the NASS Center in the ISU Rendezvous Building. Faculty, staff, and students attended the gathering to share food and recognize both women for their leadership and collaboration at ISU. The room was decorated in autumn colors, and a cake reading "To new beginnings in leadership and resilience," symbolized the next chapter of their professional journeys.

Effie Hernandez served as ISU's Native American Student Services Coordinator, where she provided academic and cultural support to Native students and coordinated outreach efforts that strengthened

tribal-university relations. Her work included organizing events that celebrated Indigenous identity and promoted student engagement across campus.

Dr. L. Herkshan served as the Tribal Engagement, Education, and Research Specialist for the Idaho Community-engaged Resilience for Energy-Water Systems (ICREWS) Program, a statewide project funded by the National Science Foundation. Her work connected education, outreach, and research to enhance collaboration between Idaho's tribal nations

and university partners. She built relationships with tribal leaders, facilitated training on ethical research practices, and advocated for equitable student opportunities. She also served on the Tribal University Advisory Board and the Indigenous Peoples' Day planning committee.

A graduate of ISU, Dr. Herkshan earned multiple degrees from the university, including a Doctor of Arts in Political Science. Her research and outreach focused on increasing Indigenous student participation in STEM and

advancing partnerships that promote culturally informed education. Among her proudest moments at ISU were chairing the 2023 Indigenous Peoples' Day planning committee, helping nominate Shoshoni language instructor Dr. Drusilla Gould for an honorary degree, and presenting research findings on the relationship between the Shoshone-Bannock Tribes and ISU.

The farewell celebra-

tion reflected the theme "Leadership and Resilience," recognizing their continued commitment to Indigenous education and community engagement. Both Hernandez and Dr. Herkshan have been active contributors to the Tribal University Advisory Board, working to enhance communication, inclusion, and collaboration between ISU and tribal nations.

Dr. Herkshan noted that her upcoming work

will remain in education and community engagement, continuing efforts to support Native students and strengthen ethical research partnerships between universities and tribes.

She expressed gratitude for the support for the support shown by colleagues and students at the gathering, emphasizing the importance of community connection during times of transition.

Checks for minors need to be cashed by December 31. All minor checks not cashed by that date will be voided and sent to the minors Trust

Account.

Per capita checks are only valid for 30 days.

Lathrop addresses Nuclear Energy & Indigenous Futures at ISU where sustainable energy futures discussed; tour at INL

POCATELLO – Tribal, academic, and federal representatives participated in a two-day collaboration focused on nuclear energy education, tribal engagement, and workforce development on November 5-6.

The events were hosted by Idaho State University (ISU), Idaho National Laboratory (INL), and Native Nuclear, a Native-led nonprofit organization that connects Indigenous professionals and communities with the nuclear energy sector.

On November 5, ISU hosted “Nuclear Energy & Indigenous Futures” at the Bengal Theater inside the Pond Student Union. The session featured a keynote presentation by Scott Lathrop, founder and CEO of Native Nuclear. The presentation and Q&A session centered on nuclear energy and Indigenous participation in shaping sustainable energy futures. Attendees included Tribal University Advisory Board (TUAB) members, ISU students, faculty, staff, and community members. The event was coordinated by ISU’s Office of Tribal Relations, directed by Echo Marshall.

On November 6, the

Native Nuclear delegation visited Idaho National Laboratory facility in Idaho Falls. The visit aimed to strengthen coordination among tribal governments, INL leadership, and the Department of Energy (DOE) regarding research, safety, and engagement in nuclear technology and policy.

Participants included Scott Lathrop and Jesika Hernandez of Native Nuclear; and Echo Marshall of ISU; Alana Edmo, Wyatt Peterson, Terrence “TJ” Tso of the Shoshone-Bannock Tribes. The visit was coordinated by INL’s Tour and Protocol Liaison Kim Whitehouse and hosted by INL Tribal Programs Specialist Elese Teton.

The day began at INL’s Meeting Center in Idaho Falls with a Department of

Energy overview presented by the Deputy Manager for Nuclear Energy Operations and Security. INL leaders outlined the laboratory’s mission, workforce, and technical capabilities. Throughout the visit, discussions addressed tribal engagement, workforce development, policy coordination, and research partnerships.

Topics included expanding partnerships for transparent communication with tribal governments, increasing Native student participation in INL internships, exploring early dialogue on modernizing the 1995 Idaho Settlement agreement, and developing collaborative outreach materials that highlight nuclear operations from testing to waste storage. The Native Nuclear visit concluded with plans for continued coordination between Native organizations, Idaho State University, Idaho National Laboratory, and the Department of Energy to advance education, research, and Indigenous involvement in the nuclear energy field. The two-day program provided structured dialogue and direct exposure to national laboratory operations supporting future collaboration in energy science and technology.

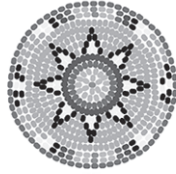

After 43 days, historic shutdown nearly over leaving no winners & much frustration

WASHINGTON (AP) — The longest government shutdown in history could conclude as soon as November 12, Day 43, with almost no one happy with the final result.

Democrats didn't get the health insurance provisions they demanded added to the spending deal. And Republicans, who control the levers of power in Washington, didn't escape blame, according to polls and some state and local elections that went poorly for them.

The fallout of the shutdown landed on millions of Americans, including federal workers who went without paychecks and airline passengers who had their trips delayed or canceled. An interruption in nutrition assistance programs contributed to long lines at food banks and added emotional distress going into the holiday season.

The agreement includes bipartisan bills worked out by the Senate Appropriations Committee to fund parts of government — food aid, veterans programs and the legislative branch, among other things. All other funding would be extended until the end of January, giving lawmakers more than two months to finish additional spending bills.

Here's a look at how the shutdown started and is likely to end:

What led to the shutdown

Democrats made several demands to win their support for a short-term funding bill, but the central one was an extension of an enhanced tax credit that lowers the cost of health coverage obtained through Affordable Care Act marketplaces.

The tax credit was boosted during the COVID-19 pandemic response, again through President Joe Biden's big energy and health care bill, and it's set to expire at the end of December. Without it, premiums on average will more than double for millions of Americans. More than 2 million people would lose health insurance coverage altogether next year, the Congressional Budget Office

projected.

"Never have American families faced a situation where their health care costs are set to double — double in the blink of an eye," said Senate Democratic leader Chuck Schumer, D-N.Y.

While Democrats called for negotiations on the matter, Republicans said a funding bill would need to be passed first.

"Republicans are ready to sit down with Democrats just as soon as they stop holding the government hostage to their partisan demands," Senate Majority Leader John Thune, R-S.D., said.

Thune eventually promised Democrats a December vote on the tax credit extension to help resolve the standoff, but many Democrats demanded a guaranteed fix, not just a vote that is likely to fail.

Thune's position was much the same as the one Schumer took back in October 2013, when Republicans unsuccessfully sought to roll back parts of the Affordable Care Act in exchange for funding the government. "Open up all of the government, and then we can have a fruitful discussion," Schumer said then.

Democratic leaders under pressure

The first year of President Donald Trump's second term has seen more than 200,000 federal workers leave their job through firings, forced relocations or the Republican administration's deferred resignation program, according to the Partnership for Public Service. Whole agencies that don't align with the administration's priorities have been dismantled. And billions of dollars previously approved by Congress have been frozen or canceled.

Democrats have had to rely on the courts to block some of Trump's efforts, but they have been unable to do it through legislation. They were also powerless to stop Trump's big tax cut and immigration crackdown bill that Republicans helped pay for

by cutting future spending on safety net programs such as Medicaid and SNAP, formerly known as food stamps.

The Democrats' struggles to blunt the Trump administration's priorities has prompted calls for the party's congressional leadership to take a more forceful response.

Schumer experienced that firsthand after announcing in March that he would support moving ahead with a funding bill for the 2025 budget year. There was a protest at his office, calls from progressives that he be primaried in 2028 and suggestions that the Democratic Party would soon be looking for new leaders.

This time around, Schumer demanded that Republicans negotiate with Democrats to get their votes on a spending bill. The Senate rules, he noted, requires bipartisan support to meet the 60-vote threshold necessary to advance a spending bill.

But those negotiations did not occur, at least not with Schumer. Republicans instead worked with a small group of eight Democrats to tee up a short-term bill to fund the government generally at current levels and accused Schumer of catering to the party's left flank when he refused to go along.

"The Senate Democrats are afraid that the radicals in their party will say that they caved," House Speaker Mike Johnson, R-La., said at one of his many daily press conferences.

The blame game

The political stakes in the shutdown are huge, which is why leaders in both parties have held nearly daily press briefings to shape public opinion.

Roughly 6 in 10 Americans say Trump and Republicans in Congress have "a great deal" or "quite a bit" of responsibility for the shutdown, while 54% say the same about Democrats in Congress, according to the poll from The Associated Press-NORC Center for Public Affairs Research.

At least three-quarters of Ameri-

cans believe each deserves at least a "moderate" share of blame, underscoring that no one was successfully evading responsibility.

Both parties looked to the Nov. 4 elections in Virginia, New Jersey and elsewhere for signs of how the shutdown was influencing public opinion. Democrats took comfort in their overwhelming successes. Trump called it a "big factor, negative" for Republicans. But it did not change the GOP's stance on negotiating. Instead, Trump ramped up calls for Republicans to end the filibuster in the Senate, which would pretty much eliminate the need for the majority party to ever negotiate with the minority.

Damage of the shutdown

The Congressional Budget Office says that the negative impact on the economy will be mostly recovered once the shutdown ends, but not entirely. It estimated the permanent economic loss at about \$11 billion for a six-week shutdown.

Beyond the numbers, though, the shutdown created a cascade of troubles for many Americans. Federal workers missed paychecks, causing financial and emotional stress. Travelers had their flights delayed and at times canceled. People who rely on safety net programs such as the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program saw their benefits stopped, and Americans throughout the country lined up for meals at food banks.

"This dysfunction is damaging enough to our constituents and economy here at home, but it also sends a dangerous message to the watching world," said Sen. Jerry Moran, R-Kan. "It demonstrates to our allies that we are an unreliable partner, and it signals to our adversaries that we can't work together to meet even the most fundamental responsibilities of Congress."

is funded through the Idaho Advance Energy Consortium. It is focused on understanding whether such a technology could ever be safe, sustainable, and consistent with the Tribes community values. She said once the study is complete, its findings will be presented to the Fort

Hall Business Council for review and direction on any next possible steps.

Edmo said the studies help them determine what options best align with, "our values of cultural integrity, environmental stewardship and economic benefit."

FH Recreation awarded \$350,000 Food Access Grant for 2-year term

FORT HALL — Fort Hall Recreation was recently awarded a Food Production and Access Grant for a two-year term with a total amount of \$350,000.

Recreation program manager Juan Rodriguez said, "The grant provides funding to strengthen local food systems and improves access to fresh, healthy foods in the Fort Hall community." Rodriguez explained the grant supports both food production and food access efforts, including local partnerships, and helps eligible food insecure prediabetics and diabetics access to afford fresh fruits and vegetables while supporting local food producers. Rodriguez said at this time the program is specific to food insecure prediabetics and diabetics.

The program will be hiring two part-time employees a Program Coordinator and Administrative Assistant, for the two-year duration of the grant. He believes the positions will help expand their impact to the community.

The program will use one-third of the total grant towards the Produce Prescription program, which is part of the Tribe's new Food is Medicine initiative. The two remaining thirds of the grant will fund the systems, staff, and new hires needed to support participants and carry out the goals of the program.

Patients with high A1C levels referred by Indian Health Service and HRSA, once new staff is hired patients can obtain referrals.

Rodriguez said he would like to thank Dawn Pierce who is the Board President of the Idaho Hunger Relief Task Force from Boise, she has worked alongside the Tribe for the past couple of years to strengthen food access and community programs.

Rodriguez hopes within the next two years that the Tribe can secure funding to continue this vital program once the grant runs out.
